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Medical Center's New Stroke Sub-Specialty Program Saving Lives, Restoring Hope

In early April, Richmond University Medical Center performed the first successful mechanical thrombectomy procedure in its history, saving the life of 71-year-old Beth Kohn, a Staten Island resident. On May 30, Kohn returned to the hospital on her own, walking and talking, to say thank you.

"I want to tell all the people on the team that I am forever grateful," said Kohn during a special ceremony held in the Sipp Auditorium. Joined by her husband, Kohn recalled that she was at home in early April when she started having trouble speaking and experienced paralysis on her right side. She was rushed to Richmond University Medical Center, where the stroke team administered TPA, a clot-busting drug.

It was determined that she would also need a mechanical thrombectomy, a special device threaded through the blood vessels to the site of the stroke-causing blood clot in the brain. The device grabs the clot and removes it, restoring blood flow to brain tissue. Less than two hours after her arrival, the clot was removed and Kohn was talking to nurses and had regained full use of her extremities.

"The most cutting-edge treatment for strokes is now available to the people of Staten Island, enhancing their lives," said Allan Perel, M.D., board-certified director of the hospital's neurology/stroke team. "We at RUMC now have the most up-to-date cuttingedge technology to treat patients with an acute stroke, and improve their function post stroke." Prior to having the capability to perform a thrombectomy on site, stroke victims treated at the hospital in need of the procedure were transferred to other medical facilities. By partnering with Interventional Neuro Associates (INA), this procedure adds to the award-winning, nationally accredited stroke care services offered at the medical center.

"Our goal is to give every patient the chance to get back home in the best possible condition," added Jeffrey Farkas, M.D., the board-certified radiologist of Interventional Neuro Associates who performed Kohn's mechanical thrombectomy. "Being able to partner with Richmond University Medical Center to offer this new line of care to the residents of Staten Island will enhance patient outcomes because they will no longer need to travel long distances, away from home, which would delay what may very well be a life-saving procedure."

Back in April I mentioned that our hospital was selected by the American Hospital Association (AHA) as a nominee for its 2019 Quest for Quality Prize. Each year the AHA awards the Quest for Quality Prize to one health care facility in the country that has demonstrated improved quality of care and advanced the well-being of its community through leadership and innovative practices.

More than 800 health care facilities across the country applied for the prize, of which 40 were selected based on their application. Out of these 40 hospitals, 6 were then chosen for a site visit by the AHA. Richmond University Medical Center was selected as one of these six finalists, and on March 11, a team of quality and safety experts from the AHA visited our hospital as part of the final step in selecting this year's winner.

I am excited to announce that Richmond University Medical Center will be awarded the AHA's citation of merit later this month in San Diego. We were selected along with the 2019 prize winner Carolinas Rehabilitation in Charlotte, North Carolina, and finalist Mission Health in Asheville, North Carolina. Carolinas Rehabilitation on the Carolinas Medical Center campus provides both inpatient and outpatient services. They are the first rehabilitation hospital to win the AHA's Quest for Quality prize. Our other fellow award winner, Mission Health, is a growing seven-hospital health system serving nearly 1 million people in 18 counties with a staff of more than 12,000 people.

The AHA selected our hospital as an award recipient after being thoroughly impressed by the wide range of programs

and services we have to address the high rate of opioid use in our community, especially our focus on providing behavioral and primary care services to this patient population. They were also impressed with how we effectively use a community needs assessment to address social determinants of health throughout Staten Island.

So as you can see, our mighty hospital is in great company and our leading edge services are now in the national spotlight. A huge thanks goes out to so many people who helped to make this award possible for us, especially assistant vice president of clinical informatics and population health, Boris Molchanskiy, who submitted the initial application and coordinated the AHA visit. This is a tremendous hospitalwide accomplishment we should all be proud of! Congratulations to all!

Richmond University Medical Center Recognized For Commitment to Quality Stroke Care

Richmond University Medical Center's stroke care program received another major recognition in June when the American Heart Association/American Stroke Association awarded the hospital its Get With The Guidelines Target: Stroke Honor Roll Elite Plus Gold Plus Quality Achievement Award.

To earn the award, the hospital met specific quality achievement measures including evaluation of the proper use of medications and other stroke treatments as well as ensuring stroke care practices at the hospital were in alignment with the most up-todate, evidence-based guidelines. The award also recognizes the hospital's commitment to follow-up care including providing patients with education on managing their health, and scheduling a follow-up visit before their discharge. The added distinction of "Target: Stroke Elite Plus" is in recognition of quality measures the hospital has also implemented to reduce the time between a stroke patient's arrival at the hospital and treatment using the clot-busting tissue plasminogen activator, or TPA.

In May, the hospital also earned The Joint Commission's Gold Seal of Approval and the American Heart Association/ American Stroke Association's Heart-Check mark for Advanced Certification for Primary Stroke Centers. In early April, the hospital also unveiled its new stroke mechanical thrombectomy subspecialty program. Several successful procedures have already been performed by the hospital's neurology department.

Over 100 people attended the public forum, which featured experts from the New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene and Columbia University. Dr. Saverimuttu was the only local physician on the panel.

"There are no words to describe how it feels when you know that someone is still alive because of what you and your team did," Dr. Kopolovich said. "When you do save a life, it's never by yourself. It takes a team. I am proud to be part of such a great team of professionals at Richmond University Medical Center. We're saving lives every day."
