Richmond University Medical Center Announces Merger with Staten Island Mental Health Society

Merger Strengthens, Expands Behavioral Health Programs and Services Provided to Staten Island

Richmond University Medical Center and Staten Island Mental Health Society, two non-profit health care providers who have each served Staten Island for over 100 years, announced their merger, effective January 1, 2019. Services and programs operated by Staten Island Mental Health Society will be fully integrated as a division of Richmond University Medical Center.

Staten Island Mental Health Society assisted nearly

6,000 children and their families annually. The Society provided services through more than 25 programs operated at over 18 locations throughout the borough. Outpatient therapeutic

services, individual and family counseling, school based clinic treatment services, and the largest Program Head Start on Staten Island were the among programs provided by the Staten Island Mental Health Society. These services will now continue through Richmond University Medical Center.

"Richmond University Medical Center is delighted

to welcome Staten Island Mental Health Society into the RUMC family," RUMC Board of Trustees Chair Kathryn K. Rooney said. "On behalf of our board, I want to thank Staten Island Mental Health Society Board Chair John Tapinis for his leadership throughout the process. I would also like to thank John and his entire board for their years of dedication and commitment to the families of Staten Island."

Throughout the merger process, senior administration and the board of trustees for both the medical center and Staten Island Mental Health Society worked collaboratively to ensure no disruption in services to Staten Island Mental Health Society patients and their families.

"The merger insures that all the vital programs provided by Staten Island Mental Health Society will continue to benefit the many children and families on Staten Island who utilize these essential services," John Tapinis said.

On January 16, over 50 people attended a reception in the Villa Building to celebrate the merger. Board members, faculty from both institutions, and community leaders including Council Member Joseph Borelli attended.

In recent weeks, you may have been wondering about the construction going on behind our generator facility, located across from the emergency department. In past announcements I've made mention that the hospital is constructing a new staff parking lot. Soon construction crews will begin installing dry wells for drainage and utility lines that will run under the parking lot. They are also in the process of using most of the displaced soil to build ten to fourteen foot high berms. Working with our neighbors around the hospital it was decided that berms will provide nearby homeowners with a buffer between our hospital grounds and their homes. Bushes, shrubs, and flowerbeds will be planted on these berms in the spring to provide a beautiful landscape around the new parking lot.

Once the dry wells, utility lines, and berms are complete, the ground will be leveled so that paving can begin. The final phase will be the erecting of light fixtures and the painting of lines. The anticipated completion of the parking lot should be in early spring, weather permitting.

To ensure security, the new lot will be illuminated 24/7 and will only be accessible by ID badge. When complete, the new parking lot will have over 200 new spaces, which means fewer cars on side streets. It also provides us with the opportunity to explore expanding our visitor parking lot to accommodate the growing number of families and patients who come to our hospital to receive care. I view the new parking lot as the official kickoff to our ambitious plan of expansion and renovation, which includes our new emergency department, our cogeneration facility, and the first phase of the future expansion and renovation of our perioperative and critical care units.

Speaking of care, February is American Heart Month. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, heart disease is the leading cause of death in the United States. More than 600,000 people die of heart disease each year. That accounts for one in four deaths in our country. Heart disease can happen to anyone, so it is important that you go visit your doctor regularly. Your doctor can perform different tests such as chest x-rays, electrocardiograms, and exercise stress tests to diagnose heart disease. Use American Heart Month as a reminder to go for a check-up today!
