
Center for Cancer Care

The opening of our new Center for Cancer Care - located at 1000 South Avenue - was a huge success! The new state-of-the-art center will bring much-needed additional support to Staten Island, which experiences some of the highest cancer rates in New York.

With speeches delivered by our President & CEO Daniel J. Messina, Ph.D., FACHE, LNHA; Richard Salhany, MBA, FACHE Senior Vice President for Strategic Planning & Medical Operations, Executive Director, A.C.O.; and Board Chairperson Kathryn Krause Rooney, Esq.; Dr. Marc Adams, Director of Radiation and Oncology; and Dr. Thomas J. Forlenza, Director of Oncology, attendees were inspired by our new state-of-the-art facility that will house the most sophisticated tools and technologies available to diagnose and fight cancer. The cancer care professionals will work to develop comprehensive care plans and preventive initiatives, in addition to providing radiation therapy treatments. The center will also be used to train residents and hem atology/oncology fellows in cancer care "We see this as a springboard for a program that will continue to grow, combining medical oncology and radiation oncology," said Daniel Messina, president and CEO of RUMC.

Welcome to the July issue of the Chronicle. There are several exciting projects and hospital events to report on.

First let me begin with a special thanks to all who made the grand opening of our Center for Cancer Care at 1000 South Avenue a success. Over 100 people attended the event, and it is an exciting step forward to be able to offer a new comprehensive state of the art cancer care center at this convenient mid-island location.

Work continues on the former Walgreens location at the intersection of Victory Blvd. and Clove Road. This location will house the Breast and Women's' Center and our third Immediate/Walk-In Primary Care location, offering an additional location to complement our facilities on Forest Ave. and Hylan Blvd. Tiesha Wilson, MD, a fellowship trained breast surgeon, will help lead the Breast and Women's Center. In addition to being the only fellowship trained breast surgeon on Staten Island, she is also trained in oncoplasty, which combines breast cancer surgery with cosmetic reconstruction. The Breast and Women's Center will offer 3D mammography, breast biopsies and related services. This new program is slated for completion sometime in late summer.

In the final construction and renovation stages is a new Cardio Pulmonary Rehabilitation Center. This much needed service, on the ground level of the residents building, is also slated for completion soon. On the Emergency Department Construction front, we have completed the revised design and more details will be forthcoming regarding the specifics of the physical construction start slated in first quarter 2019 as well as that of the new Co-Generation Plant. Additional project updates will be included in future issues.

The Center for Wound Healing



Richmond University Medical Center is committed in caring about the health and wellness of Staten islanders. The opportunity to provide exceptional patient care and to improve quality of life of our patients is our goal. Chronic wounds can present a huge burden in patient's lives. It can affect their physical, emotional, social, and economical aspects of their lives. Non-healing wounds can develop from diabetes, trauma from surgery, bone infections, poor circulation, burns, and pressure ulcers.

Along with using other modern wound therapies, the staff at the Center for Wound Healing have introduced two new advanced treatments. The first is called Kerecis[™] Omega3 Wound. Kerecis[™] uses intact fish skin from Icelandic cod to repair tissue damage. The EPA and DHA Omega 3 fatty acids help to reduce inflammation of the wound. The second is the total contact system. Total contact casting is considered the Gold Standard of Care for off-loading a diabetic foot ulcer. TCC-EZ[®] creates a natural healing chamber that promotes active wound healing.

These new products help achieve our goal to improve the general well-being of our patients as their activities of daily living are not affected by daily laborious wound care dressing changes. The patients only need to come in once a week for casting and dressing changes.



RUMC to Open Clinic at Susan Wagner High School

Richmond University Medical Center is proud to announce that a School –Based Health Center (SHBC) will open soon at Susan Wagner High School. SBHCs are like a doctor's office within a school and provide a great benefit to students. Research shows that SBHCs can help a student manage his/her illness at school and, therefore, decrease absenteeism from school and parents' time away from work as well as fewer hospitalizations and trips to the emergency room. A student that is healthy and shows up to class is better equipped to succeed academically.

SBHC can serve as a student's Primary Care Provider (PCP) or complement services provided by an outside PCP. It provides scheduled and walk-in services when schools are in session and 24-hour telephone coverage to assist with problems that may arise when the SBHC is closed. Primary care and preventive health services, first aid care to all students registered in the building, and emergency care to all in building will be part of the program.

The new SBHC at Susan Wagner High School provides Richmond University Medical Center an excellent opportunity to further its mission of providing high quality community based care to residents across Staten Island.

This event was set up with a variety of local organizations to offer education, resources, and fun activities for fathers and their children.
