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Heroic EMT, Richard McMahon, Celebrated With "Clap Out" Ceremony Upon Release From RUMC.

Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) Richard McMahon, 25, who wrestled a gun from an ambulance patient after being shot by him in the shoulder on Forest Ave., was discharged from RUMC on May 20, less than a day after the incident.

Richard McMahon was greeted as a hero, with applause from hospital officials, NYPD officers, fellow EMTs, and local law enforcement officials. McMahon was wheeled out in a wheelchair upon his release and was given a gift basket by RUMC staff. A number of motorcycle groups, including members of the Staten Island chapter of Bikers Against Child Abuse, were present at the ceremony. They drove off from the hospital behind McMahon and his family. Retired NYPD detective Marty Graham and an offduty Department of Sanitation Lieutenant, Joseph Perrone, who apprehended the shooter after the encounter, were at the clap-out ceremony and greeted McMahon when he left the hospital.

Staten Island District Attorney Michael E. McMahon was able to visit the 25-year-old EMT in his hospital room before his release and spent time with him and his family.

We are honored and happy to call Richard McMahon and his partner, Carrieann Dixon, who heroically drove him to RUMC after the shooting, part of our incredible team at RUMC.

Great progress is being made on our new state-of-the-art Emergency Department, with an estimated opening of late summer. I am also happy to announce the expansion and enhancement of our partnership with the Mount Sinai Health System. Adding Mount Sinai's emergency medicine expertise to our own team of experienced professionals will provide our community with expanded access to outstanding healthcare services in a setting that's close

to home. Under this agreement, Mount Sinai and RUMC will integrate care for emergency medicine, trauma, and critical care services provided at RUMC's Emergency Department and extend admitting privileges at RUMC to Mount Sinai medical specialists.

"We look forward to collaborating with the leadership of RUMC and their dedicated team of professionals to bring Mount Sinai's expertise in emergency medicine care to the community of Staten Island," said Margaret Pastuszko, president and chief operating officer of Mount Sinai Health System. "The preservation of the current RUMC Emergency Department's clinical and administrative leadership will also enhance a smooth transition for the patients and staff and drive optimally coordinated care. Mount Sinai's mission is to advance medicine and health through unrivaled education, research and discovery — and to deliver care that is the safest, highest quality, and most accessible and equitable to all."

RUMC's Emergency Department is equipped to handle all levels of adult and pediatric emergencies and is a New York State Department of Health designated Stroke and STEMI treatment center as well as Staten Island's only Sexual Assault Forensic Examiner (SAFE) Center of Excellence. Treating over 50,000 people annually, it is one of the busiest emergency departments in the New York metropolitan area. It has been in the epicenter of the COVID-19 pandemic, caring for 9,000 COVID positive patients since the pandemic began.

The new Emergency Department will maintain its advanced Trauma Center while fostering strategic growth and academic excellence. It will have 35,000 square feet of space and will occupy the ground level of a new two-story pavilion connected to the existing hospital. Features include expanded emergency trauma, critical care and resuscitation unit and triage sections; enhanced specialty areas for pediatrics and urgent care; new Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SAFE) suites to ensure privacy and protection; behavioral urgent care; larger ambulance bays; and a patient friendly drop-off area with easier front entrance access. The second floor of the new pavilion will be used for upgrades and expansion, including ten new, high-tech surgical operating suites and perioperative space. I know we all look forward to the official unveiling of this great project with eager anticipation.

Soon summer will be upon us and I want to extend my thanks for everyone's hard work and dedication to Richmond University Medical Center, as well as take the opportunity to wish you a safe and restful upcoming summer. Happy Father's Day to all!

Richmond University Medical Center (RUMC) held a ribbon cutting Wednesday May 25 at 4:00 pm on the third floor to name its Neonatal Intensive Care Unit. Dr. Daniel J. Messina, PdD, FACHE and Chief Executive Officer of RUMC, announced the generous pledge by the Zenna Family Foundation for \$1,000,000 to name the Wayne Zenna Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU). The generosity of the Zenna family is a shining example of the very good in the world.

The Zenna family has lived in Staten Island for 40 years, and is very supportive of the community. They created the Zenna Family Foundation in 1999; the foundation supports only nonprofits with a 501 C 3 IRS status. Family spokesperson Gregory Zenna said," We want to give back to the community that has been so good to us. When we heard about the renovation of the RUMCs NICU, we immediately wanted to get involved. This unit cares for over 600 premature infants and other infants with health issues annually. The ability to offer such lifesaving care in a more comfortable environment was a cause we could easily get behind. My parents and I are extremely blessed and proud we are

able to name the NICU after my late brother, Wayne Zenna. It is a great way to honor his memory."

The renovation of the unit will include private spaces where parents and infants can bond. A new infant transition room will also be built in the renovation, which will allow parents of NICU graduates to spend the night with nursing support in preparation for going home. "This "dress rehearsal" for the transition out of the hospital is very reassuring to parents taking their babies home after a stay in the NICU, helping them to gain more confidence," said Dr. Santosh Parab, Chief of Neonatology at RUMC.

"The significance of choosing this day to rename the NICU after my brother, Wayne is because he passed away at the age of three and today was the anniversary of his birthday, he would have been 47 years old today. We chose to donate to RUMC because their facilities are second to none and as they transition into the future, this donation will help. Staten Islanders take care of one another and parents need to know that their child receives the best care possible," said Gregory Zenna. "With this generous donation from the Zenna family, we will be able to expand our treatment space to accommodate more room for patients and their families. The open space and individual pods will allow NICU patients and their families to maximize the bonding experience," said Dr. Daniel J. Messina.

The remodel is also being helped financially by the NYC Capital Grant from Staten Island Borough President Vito Fossella, who supported the project with a \$2 million funding allocation. B.P. Fossella was a part of this special event spoke and said, "I wanted to come out of respect and it seems like RUMC is going through a great revitalization. To the Zenna family, we thank you. There's nothing more important than your child and there's nothing more sensitive than when your newborn cannot make it and the people here have got the best track record that I've seen. You are truly bringing newborns into life and there's nothing more important to all of us than that notion of having that help for a young child. And the fact that you all dedicate your lives to making that happen, I'm grateful to be able to support the hospital in any way we can and just say thank you."

Since 1949, America has observed May is Mental Health Month. On May 17, Richmond University Medical Center leadership, staff, and community leaders tied ribbons around trees on hospital property to bring attention to the needs of individuals who struggle with mental health illness.

"Many individuals struggle with mental illness in silence and alone. Mental illness affects people of all ages, ethnicities, socio-economic status, and professions," RUMC president and chief executive officer, Daniel J. Messina, PhD, MPA, FACHE, said, "The COVID-19 pandemic has had a tremendous impact on the mental health of people of all ages. Over the past year we have seen an increase in people seeking assistance for mental and behavioral health issues, including depression, anxiety, and substance use. May is Mental Health Awareness Month and is an opportunity to show the connection between physical and mental health; one doesn't exist without the other."

According to the National Alliance on Mental Health (NAMI), 1 in 5 adults in the United States and 1 in 6 youth between the ages of 6 and 17 experiences a mental health condition in a given year. Richmond University Medical Center is the leading provider of behavioral health and substance use treatment programs on Staten Island for adults, adolescents, and children. RUMC operates a dedicated and comprehensive outpatient Center for Integrative Behavioral Medicine located at 1130 South Avenue. The comprehensive psychiatric emergency department at RUMC is Staten Island's only psychiatric emergency room with a Mobile Crisis program. The hospital's inpatient psychiatric child and adolescent program is the island's sole source for acute inpatient psychiatric services for children and adolescents, and the hospital administers numerous programs for children and their families through the Staten Island Mental Health Society, which is a division of RUMC.

"This year's theme for mental health awareness month is 'Together for Mental Health.' Together we can bring our shared vision where those afflicted with mental illness can have access to the treatment and support they need to lead healthy lives," assistant vice president for Behavioral Health Services, Joanne Pietro, RN said. "We at RUMC stand together with our patients experiencing mental health issues and renew our commitment to improving access to care, treatment, and services as well as providing the support they need."

"Mental health awareness should not be a celebration once a year, but should be recognized every day of the year," chairman and medical director of the department of Psychiatry & Behavioral Sciences. Dr. Joel A. Idowu, said. "The more we raise awareness about mental health, the more people are able to recognize mental health issues and seek treatment. The RUMC department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Science is fortunate to have well-trained, qualified. and skilled clinicians and physician staff who provide high quality mental health treatment to those who come to RUMC to address their mental health issues."
